

Native to: South America Crop Hosts: Numerous plants and crops including beans, broccoli, peppers, cucurbits and tomatoes.






Native to: South America Texas: first reported in the San Antonio area; now found in over 50 Texas counties






Native to: China Crop Hosts: Feeds on many plants and documented to destroy grape vineyards in Brazil.





Native to: Central Africa Crop Hosts: Feeds on over 40 types of crops like cabbage, tomatoes, spinach beans and cucumbers.











How can it spread? Through international trade. It has been intercepted a over 110 times on 37 different plant genera.






How can it spread? Landscaping accidentally spread it across Southeastern US in ornamentals, nursery stock, soil, and mulch.

Introduced into Florida in 1960s by a traveler.

10 years and \$1 Million to eradicate Re-introduced in 2011 and another 10 years & \$23 Million to re-eradicate. Meanwhile, spreads harmful invasive parasites (especially in Hawaii).
